

General Assembly and  
Directing a Statewide Hiring Freeze**

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor of the State of Colorado and, in particular, pursuant to Article IV, Section 2 and Article IV, Section 9 of the Colorado Constitution, and as recognized in Article V, Section 7, I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, hereby find that the following extraordinary occasions exist to convene the Seventy-Fifth General Assembly to meet in special session, and to take other actions including a hiring freeze, to address the fiscal crisis caused by recent federal action.

1 I. Background

2  
3 On July 4, 2025, President of the United States Donald Trump  
4 signed H.R. 1 into law through the reconciliation process. H.R. 1 will  
5 cause an immediate and significant negative impact to State revenue –  
6 reducing State revenue by over \$1.2 billion in the current Fiscal Year, and  
7 by approximately \$700 million in Fiscal Year 2027 and Fiscal Year 2028.  
8

9 While the General Assembly passed and I signed a balanced  
10 budget on April 28, 2025 for Fiscal Year 2026, because of federal tax  
11 changes for the current year that were subsequently passed by Congress  
12 but retroactively applied, the State budget is no longer balanced for the  
13 current year, no longer has a surplus under the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights  
14 (TABOR), and in fact faces a significant shortfall. The Office of State  
15 Planning and Budgeting (OSPB) projects the deficit for the current fiscal  
16 year to be \$783 million. Changes to State law are needed immediately to  
17 ensure the State's financial solvency and to re-balance the State budget  
18 in order to protect basic services that Coloradans rely on, including  
19 education, transportation, health care, and public safety.  
20

21 The loss of revenue to the State of Colorado is largely due to  
22 increased tax deductions for corporations; OSPB estimates 70% of the  
23 revenue loss is from corporate tax cuts. Colorado's revenues are linked  
24 to federal tax policy changes more than most states due to Colorado's use  
25 of Federal Taxable Income and a characteristic known as "rolling  
26 conformity," which means that federal tax changes are automatically  
27 adopted into the State's tax code.  
28

29 H.R. 1 also imposes increased expenses on the State, largely by shifting  
30 costs from the federal government to Colorado. Programs most impacted  
31 include the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and  
32 Medicaid, due to Provider Fee reductions, newly-imposed work  
33 requirements, and additional requirements imposed on State and local  
34 governments to redetermine eligibility for Medicaid recipients more  
35 frequently. These expenses are anticipated to be between \$50-\$100  
36 million in Fiscal Year 2027 and grow to nearly \$1 billion by 2032.  
37

38 When accounting for the loss in federal funds due to H.R. 1's  
39 changes to Medicaid and SNAP, the impact on Colorado could total more  
40 than \$3 billion.  
41

42 State government must take a holistic view of costs and revenue  
43 impacts to the State from H.R. 1. As a result, the Governor's Office  
44 looked to tax expenditures which are demonstrably ineffective,  
45 uncommon among other states, are not meeting their legislative intent,  
46 have a low return on investment, or do not align with the pro-growth  
47 goals of Colorado tax policy. I am calling this extraordinary session to ask  
48 the Colorado General Assembly to take immediate and needed  
49 TABOR-compliant action in a number of crucial areas to address the  
50 financial challenges the State is facing due to H.R. 1, re-balance the  
51 State's budget to ensure proper financial management, and preserve, as  
52 much as possible, critical State services and benefits for Coloradans. I am  
53 also asking the General Assembly to take action related to preserving  
54 access to health services, tackling the growing cost of private health  
55 insurance on the individual market, and addressing the impending and  
56 costly implementation of artificial intelligence (AI) legislation.

1 At the same time as we ask the General Assembly to act, I am also  
2 ordering State agencies to take immediate action to reduce costs. This  
3 Executive Order directs State agencies to implement a hiring freeze,  
4 effective August 27, 2025, and extending through December 31, 2025.  
5

6 This call for an extraordinary session of the General Assembly  
7 does not prescribe the specific form that the legislation should take;  
8 however, as required by Article IV, Section 9 and Article V, Section 7 of  
9 the Colorado Constitution, the business to be transacted at this special  
10 session shall be limited to the matters stated in Section III of this  
11 Executive Order.  
12

## 13 II. Purpose and Need

14

15 H.R. 1's immediate impact on Colorado's budget and ability to  
16 provide essential government services is severe. The State faces an  
17 immediate, dire budget shortfall that must be addressed as soon as  
18 possible to avoid even more severe actions in the future. I urge the  
19 General Assembly to consider and pass legislation that honors the  
20 difficult budget balancing work that occurred last session and makes  
21 needed policy and programmatic changes to preserve funding for several  
22 of Colorado's most critical services while meeting our constitutional  
23 obligation to balance our State budget.  
24

25 Current statute addresses the impacts when the State is facing a  
26 significant revenue shortfall; it delineates that if the State would use more  
27 than half of the reserve, the Governor must submit a plan to keep the  
28 State from using more of the reserve. Historically, the reserve was 4%.  
29 Over the past 14 years, the General Assembly has recognized the need for  
30 a stronger reserve to protect critical State services during an economic  
31 downturn. The reserve currently sits at 15%, but the statute has not been  
32 updated, meaning that the State would need to spend \$1.22 billion to meet  
33 the current threshold. OSPB anticipates a 50% likelihood of a recession  
34 in the coming year. Joint Budget Committee staff estimates that in the  
35 face of a moderate recession, the State would need an 18% reserve to  
36 weather the storm for two years. The General Assembly must take action  
37 to ensure the statute reflects the changing reserve and ensure that the  
38 State remains fiscally solvent in the face of a potential recession.  
39

40 H.R. 1 makes significant changes to the structure and funding of  
41 SNAP. SNAP provides needed benefits to Colorado's most vulnerable  
42 populations and a significant economic impact to the State as a whole. It  
43 provides benefits to low-income families to supplement their grocery  
44 budget so they can afford nutritious food for their health and well-being.  
45 SNAP is distributed to participants in Colorado through the Electronic  
46 Benefits Transfer (EBT) system, which sends money to benefit cards that  
47 participants can use for SNAP-approved groceries at participating  
48 retailers. Prior to the passage of H.R. 1, over \$120 million in SNAP  
49 benefits provided to Coloradans each month were 100% federally funded.  
50 In addition, the federal government covered 50% of Colorado's  
51 administrative costs for SNAP.  
52

53 With the changes to SNAP in H.R. 1, the federal administrative  
54 cost-sharing match will be reduced from 50% to 25%, creating a budget  
55 impact of nearly \$50 million annually. Additionally, beginning in October  
56 2025, the federal government will begin a one-year measurement period

1 to calculate Colorado's Payment Error Rate. This Payment Error Rate will  
2 be used to determine the State's share of funds that must be contributed  
3 to SNAP, meaning the federal government will likely no longer fund  
4 100% of Colorado's SNAP benefits. The General Assembly must take  
5 immediate action during this extraordinary session to find avenues to  
6 continue funding this crucial program that helps low-income families  
7 afford groceries.

8  
9 H.R. 1 negatively impacts health care as well. The targeted cuts to  
10 Medicaid will create more health care deserts in rural Colorado and raise  
11 insurance rates for everyone. H.R. 1 prohibits a federal match for services  
12 delivered to I.R.C. § 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that are classified  
13 as essential community providers that are primarily engaged in family  
14 planning services, reproductive health, and related medical care; provide  
15 for abortions beyond Hyde Amendment exceptions; and received more  
16 than \$800,000 in Medicaid payments in 2023. Coloradans who depend on  
17 these essential community providers, not only for reproductive health care  
18 but also to receive cost-saving preventative care and cancer screenings,  
19 will lose critical access to health care services. At the state level, we can  
20 amend State statutes to ensure Medicaid beneficiaries can continue to  
21 access care at these essential community providers. This is an immediate  
22 need and a simple fix to ensure all Coloradans have access to affordable  
23 health care, despite the federal government picking and choosing which  
24 providers can receive Medicaid payments for high-quality covered  
25 services.

26  
27 In addition, Congress's failure to extend enhanced Health  
28 Insurance Premium Tax Credits, established by the American Rescue Plan  
29 Act of 2021 (ARPA) and extended by the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022  
30 (IRA), in concert with the 2025 Marketplace Integrity and Affordability  
31 Final Rule and individual market changes set forth in H.R.1, will have a  
32 significant impact on health insurance rates in Colorado's individual  
33 health insurance market, as well as broader market impacts. July 2025  
34 rate filings by insurance carriers with the Colorado Division of Insurance  
35 are, on average, 28% higher than 2025 rates with some requested rate  
36 increases on Colorado's Western Slope of almost 40%. While the State  
37 cannot extend federal premium tax credits, we can add funds to  
38 Colorado's Health Insurance Affordability Enterprise (HIAE) in order to  
39 mitigate the impact of these extraordinary individual health insurance  
40 requested rate increases on individuals and families across the State.  
41 Without this additional support, projected coverage losses will be  
42 devastating for families and the health care system.

43  
44 As a result of H.R. 1, in addition to the areas outlined above, we  
45 must look at all cost burdens statewide and ensure our State agencies can  
46 continue to provide critical and necessary services to Coloradans. This  
47 moment requires the State to ensure efficiencies and reduce burdens  
48 wherever possible. SB24-205, "Consumer Protections for Artificial  
49 Intelligence," rightly intended to focus on unwanted bias in certain  
50 AI-driven decision-making. Unfortunately, it has become increasingly  
51 clear that the application of SB24-205 inadvertently imposes high costs  
52 on the State, local governments, and covered businesses. Across State  
53 agencies, the estimated fiscal impact for implementation of SB24-205 is  
54 near \$5 million annually, which will otherwise require supplemental  
55 appropriations for this fiscal year due to the law's February 1, 2026  
56 effective date.

1 I was pleased to work together with the sponsor and the Attorney  
2 General on a joint letter indicating our shared commitment to ensuring  
3 this AI law works for Colorado, but these changes haven't happened yet  
4 and time is running short. Given the widespread agreement that changes  
5 need to be made and the short timeline between the start of session and  
6 the implementation date, I am asking the General Assembly to work  
7 toward solutions that reduce the fiscal and negative economic impact, and  
8 streamline the requirements of SB24-205 so that it meets the objectives  
9 of consumer protection and anti-discrimination while being simpler and  
10 less expensive to implement, and to consider providing additional time  
11 for implementation.

12  
13 As the State faces budgetary pressures, it is my goal to continue to  
14 deliver critical services to Coloradans while implementing cost saving  
15 measures. In recognition of this Executive Order's request to the General  
16 Assembly to act, I am also taking executive action by ordering State  
17 agencies and departments managed by Governor-appointed executives to  
18 reduce costs by implementing a hiring freeze, effective August 27, 2025,  
19 and extending through the end of this year.

### 20 21 III. Proclamation

22  
23 I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, with this  
24 proclamation find extraordinary occasions exist to convene the  
25 Seventy-Fifth General Assembly of this State and summon the members  
26 of the Seventy-Fifth General Assembly to meet in Special Session at  
27 10:00 AM on August 21, 2025, at the State Capitol, in the City and  
28 County of Denver, and designate the following specific subjects for  
29 consideration, appropriate legislative action, and funding:

#### 30 31 A. Fiscal

32  
33 1. Concerning changes to C.R.S. § 24-2-102 and 24-75-201.5  
34 regarding revenue shortfalls and insufficient revenue.

35  
36 2. Concerning allowing the State to sell tax credits, including  
37 insurance premium tax credits, to certain taxpayers.

38  
39 3. Concerning extending decoupling through an add back of the  
40 qualified business income deduction in C.R.S. § 39-22-104.

41  
42 4. Concerning adjustments and reductions to the Home Office and  
43 Regional Home Office Rate Reduction in C.R.S. § 10-3-209.

44  
45 5. Concerning expanding the foreign listed jurisdictions in C.R.S.  
46 § 39-22-303 to ensure companies are paying appropriate taxes in  
47 Colorado.

48  
49 6. Concerning adjustments and reductions to the Sales Tax Vendor  
50 Fees in C.R.S. § 39-26-105.

51  
52 7. Concerning decoupling through an add back of the federal  
53 Foreign-Derived Intangible Income (FDII) deduction.

54  
55

1 B. Health Care

2

3 1. Concerning amendments to ensure access to services delivered  
4 by providers banned by H.R. 1 from federal Medicaid financing; and  
5 amendments to C.R.S. § 25.5-5-329 to ensure availability of Medicaid  
6 services to eligible individuals.

7

8 2. Concerning adjustments to the Health Insurance Affordability  
9 Enterprise (HIAE) to facilitate a reduction in premium increases and  
10 avoid health insurance coverage loss for those in the individual market  
11 and those unable to purchase health insurance through Connect for Health  
12 Colorado.

13

14 C. Food Security

15

16 1. Concerning adjustments to the referred measures in HB25-1274  
17 (Healthy School Meals for All Program) regarding the uses of the Healthy  
18 School Meals for All cash fund to include Supplemental Nutrition  
19 Assistance Program costs, and related statutory provisions.

20

21 D. Artificial Intelligence

22

23 1. Concerning adjustments and reductions to the fiscal and  
24 implementation impacts of SB24-205 on covered businesses and State  
25 and local governments.

26

27 IV. Directives

28

29 A. In order to implement further cost control measures required to  
30 stabilize the State budget, I hereby order that all State agencies and  
31 departments managed by Governor-appointed executives institute a hiring  
32 freeze.

33

34 B. Effective on August 27, 2025, I order State agencies to cease posting  
35 for new job opportunities with start dates in 2025, notwithstanding:

36

37 1. Positions that are fully funded through TABOR-exempt funding  
38 sources are excluded; and

39

40 2. The Governor's Office shall issue a directive outlining which  
41 positions will be exempt from this hiring freeze, including those  
42 necessary to ensure public safety and the safe and continuous operations  
43 of facilities in which people are in the care and custody of the State, and  
44 to implement changes to safety net programs required by H.R. 1.

45

46 C. Additionally, I urge all other elected officials in the executive branch  
47 to implement a hiring freeze in their agencies to ensure that State  
48 government fulfills its obligations to reduce costs in our control and to  
49 further reduce the need for more disruptive cost-saving measures that will  
50 impact Coloradans.

51

52 D. This Section IV shall take effect on August 27, 2025, and remain in  
53 effect until December 31, 2025, subject to the exemptions listed in  
54 Section IV. B, unless modified or rescinded by future Executive Order of  
55 the Governor.

Developer duty to avoid algorithmic discrimination - required documentation.** (1) On and after ~~February 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~, a developer of a high-risk artificial intelligence system shall use reasonable care to protect consumers from any known or reasonably foreseeable risks of algorithmic discrimination arising from the intended and contracted uses of the high-risk artificial intelligence system. In any enforcement action brought on or after ~~February 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~, by the attorney general pursuant to section 6-1-1706, there is a rebuttable presumption that a developer used reasonable care as required under this section if the developer complied with this section and any additional requirements or obligations as set forth in rules promulgated ~~ADOPTED~~ by the attorney general pursuant to section 6-1-1707.

(2) On and after ~~February 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~, and except as provided in subsection (6) of this section, a developer of a high-risk artificial intelligence system shall make available to the deployer or other developer of the high-risk artificial intelligence system:

(3) (a) Except as provided in subsection (6) of this section, a developer that offers, sells, leases, licenses, gives, or otherwise makes available to a deployer or other developer a high-risk artificial intelligence system on or after ~~February 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~, shall make available to the deployer or other developer, to the extent feasible, the documentation and information, through artifacts such as model cards, dataset cards, or other impact assessments, necessary for a deployer, or for a third party contracted by a deployer, to complete an impact assessment pursuant to section 6-1-1703 (3).

(4) (a) On and after ~~February 1, 2026~~ ~~OCTOBER 1, 2026~~, a developer shall make available, in a manner that is clear and readily available on the developer's website or in a public use case inventory, a statement summarizing:
